NOTICE OF ELECTIONS

Elections will be held to fill three (3) vacancies on the Board of Directors, two (2) vacancies on the Board Oversight Committee and the position of Auditor.

In compliance with Fitness and Probity requirements as per the Central Bank Reform Act 2010, nominations for positions of Director or Member of the Board Oversight Committee must be received in advance of the AGM in order for due diligence to be carried out on each candidate.

All nominations for vacancies are required to be processed through the Nominations Committee under Section 56(b) of the Credit Union Act 1997 (as amended).

RULE AMENDMENT

Rule 30 (1)(a)

That this Annual General Meeting amends Rule 30 of the Standard Rules for Credit Unions (Republic of Ireland) by the deletion of the following Rule 30 (1)(a)

(1) (a) Provided a share dividend has been declared in accordance with the Act, the directors may recommend to the annual general meeting for approval a refund to the members on record as of the end of each financial year who have been borrowers during such year of a percentage of interest which such borrowers have paid during such year, and such rate of refund shall apply to all such member borrowers. Where a credit union operates a system whereby different rates of interest are charged for different classes of loans, the board of directors may recommend a different rate of refund applicable to each class of loan. Such refunds shall apply to all member borrowers in each class of loan.

And by the insertion of the following Rule 30 (1)(a) to read:

(1) (a) The directors may recommend to the annual general meeting for approval a refund to the members on record as of the end of each financial year who have been borrowers during such year of a percentage of interest which such borrowers have paid during such year, and such rate of refund shall apply to all such member borrowers. Where a credit union operates a system whereby different rates of interest are charged for different classes of loans, the board of directors may recommend a different rate of refund applicable to each class of loan. Such refunds shall apply to all member borrowers in each class of loan.



STANDING ORDERS FOR CREDIT UNIONS FOR - ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (ROI)

1. Voting

Each member shall be entitled to one vote irrespective of his/her shareholding, in accordance with section 82(2) of the Credit Union Act, 1997 (as amended)

2 - 3 Election Procedure

- Elections to the board of directors, to the board oversight committee and the position of auditor shall be by majority vote and by secret ballot.
- 3. When nominations are announced tellers shall be appointed by the chair and ballot papers shall be distributed. Nominations shall be in the following order:
 - (a) nominations for auditor:
 - (b) nominations for members of the board oversight committee;
 - (c) nominations for directors.

When voting is completed, the votes shall be taken and tallied by the tellers. Any ballot paper which contains votes for more than the number required to be elected shall be void. All elections shall be by secret ballot and by majority vote. When the votes have been counted by the tellers, the results shall be announced by the chair. In the event that all vacancies are not filled by the first ballot further ballots shall be taken as required. In the event of an equality of votes between candidates for the remaining vacancies not filled in accordance with the above procedure one further ballot shall be taken and should that ballot fail to determine the issue, the vacancies shall be filled by lot from among such candidates having an equality of votes.

4 - 9 Motions

- 4. All motions from the floor of the AGM must be proposed and seconded by members present at the AGM and moved by the proposer. If the proposer is absent when the motion is called, the motion shall be deemed to have failed.
- A proposer of a motion may speak for such period as shall be at the discretion of the chair of the meeting and shall have the right of reply before the motion is put to the meeting for a vote.
- 6. In exercising his/her right of reply, a proposer may not introduce new material.
- 7. The seconder of a motion shall have such time as shall be allowed by the chair to second the motion.
- Members are entitled to speak on any such motion and must do so through the chair. All speakers to any motion shall have such time as shall be at the discretion of the chair.
- The chair shall have the absolute right to decide at any time when a motion has been sufficiently discussed and may put the motion

to the meeting giving the proposer the right of reply before doing so.

10 - 15 Miscellaneous

- 10. The chair of the board of directors shall be the chair of any general meeting, except where he/she is not available, in which case it shall be the vice-chair, except where he/she is not available, in which case the board shall decide amongst themselves who shall act as chair of any general meeting.
- 11. The chair may at his/her discretion, extend the privilege of the floor to any person who is not a member.
- 12. Matters not covered by the Agenda may be introduced under "Other Business" at the discretion of the chair.
- 13. The chairman's decision on any matter relating to these Standing Orders or interpretation of same shall be final.
- 1.4. No member shall have more than one vote on each question at any general meeting of the credit union or any adjournment thereof irrespective of his/her shareholding or the number of accounts in his/her name in the credit union provided, however, that except in voting at elections, the presiding member shall have a second or casting vote in the event of equality of voting. Voting by proxy shall be allowed only when a member other than a natural person votes through a representative, who is a member of the group, duly authorised in writing for that purpose and accepted as such by the board of directors.
- 15. Any matter to be decided upon by vote at the AGM shall, unless otherwise expressly provided for by law or the rules, be decided upon by simple majority.

16. Suspension of Standing Orders

Any one of these Orders or all of these Standing Orders may be suspended on a motion to this effect receiving a two-thirds majority of those present and entitled to vote.

17. Alteration of Standing Orders

Standing Orders may be amended or altered at a general meeting and only if a motion to this effect has received a two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

18. Adjournments

Adjournments of the AGM shall take place only in accordance with section 81(1) of the Credit Union Act, 1997 (as amended).

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT 2023

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to welcome you all here tonight to our 2023 AGM and I would like to thank you all for your continued support and loyalty to The Rosses Credit Union.

This past year was a successful year for The Rosses Credit Union, and I am delighted to report that we achieved a surplus of €229,351. The Board are responsible for and will continue to adopt a cautious approach and ensure that all our reserves are in line with Central Bank regulations. We will continue to ensure that TRCU is well provisioned and in line with the requirements of the Central Bank.

In terms of lending, our loan book has grown by 3.3% in the past year. 584 loans were issued during the year to the value of €4,044,699 and most of this will have been circulated throughout the community.

Our investment returns this year have also improved from €55,835 in 2022 to €114,711 in 2023, and with increased investment yields we look forward to this continuing into the future.

Membership continues to increase with 212 new members joining this year. Our online services, including now having the ability to apply for loans online, are continuing to prove very popular and we will continue to develop these services where we can benefit our members.

We offer competitive loan rates and this year we would recommend giving a further 5% interest rebate to borrowers and a small dividend of 0.25% which we feel is prudent in the current climate.

The Board of Directors continued to monitor, review, and develop our Strategic Plan in this financial year and will continue to do so to ensure the best outcomes for our members. We are grateful to have such loyal and supportive members as without you, all of this would not be possible.

We were delighted to support local clubs, groups, and charities in 2023. The Annual Credit Union Quiz and Art Competitions were a great success, and we were pleased to introduce our Student Bursary for third level students this year.

I would like to thank the staff, fellow board members and Board Oversight Committee for their assistance and support throughout the year.

Thanks to our auditors, Martin and Seamus from SMC Accountants for their guidance and support as always.

Could we have a minute's silence for our members who died during the year.

Wishing you all a happy and healthy Christmas and New Year and we look forward to continuing to provide our members with quality financial services and affordable credit in 2024.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 30th September 2023.

Principal Activities

The principal activity of the credit union is the provision of savings and loans to members in its common bond. The credit union manages its members' shares, capital and loans to members so that it earns income from the margin between interest payable and interest receivable.

Business Review

The directors are satisfied with the current year results and the year–end financial position of the credit union. The directors are aware of the financial constraints facing members' and therefore the increased difficulties collecting debts in a timely fashion. The directors however are of the opinion that the credit union is well positioned to meet these challenges and are confident of its ability to continue to operate successfully in the future.

Results and Dividends

The excess of income over expenditure for the year is set out in the Income and Expenditure Account on page 11.

The directors recommend payment of a dividend of 0.25% and a loan interest rebate of 5% for the year ended 30th September 2023. Details are shown in Note 6 to the accounts.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and challenges facing the credit union are summarised as follows:

- Members' defaulting on loans
- Not lending a sufficient proportion of funds so that too much of the credit unions resources are tied up in investment products
- Poor performance of investments
- The risk of not having sufficient cash resources to meet day to day running costs and repay members savings when demanded.

The credit union board are fully aware of the principal risks, monitors these constantly and strives to minimise all risks and handle prudently those residual risks over which it has little control.

Auditors

The auditors, SMC Chartered Accountants, have indicated their willingness to continue in office in accordance with the provisions of Section 115 of the Credit Union Act 1997, as amended.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE ROSSES CREDIT UNION LIMITED

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Rosses Credit Union Limited for the year ended 30th September 2023, which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, Balance Sheet, Statement of Changes in Reserves and Cash flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish Law and FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

In our opinion the financial statements

- give a true and fair view of the state of the Credit Union's affairs as at 30th September 2023 and its income and expenditure and cash flows for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Credit Union Act 1997, as amended.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are described below in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Credit Union in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of financial statements in Ireland, including the Ethical Standard issued by the Irish Auditing and Accounting Supervisory Authority (IAASA), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Credit Union's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from the date when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the directors with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

Other information

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement in the financial statements or a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report

- (1) The Regulatory reserve of the Credit Union as % of total assets as at 30th September 2023 was 11.20%. (2022: 11.40%).
- (2) In accordance with S45 of the Credit Union Act 1997 (as amended) The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. put in place an Operational Risk reserve in 2016. The Board approved a transfer of €75,000 from the realised reserve to the new Operational Risk reserve, following the completion of an internal process of assessing the level of the reserve required to cover the operational risk within the Credit Union. The operational risk reserve as a % of total assets as at 30 September 2023 was 0.38% (2022: 0.40%).
- (3) Following commencement of S13 of the 2012 Act, the requirement for Credit Unions to transfer 10% of their annual surplus to their statutory reserve (now known as the Regulatory reserve) each year has been removed. Notwithstanding this the Board of The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. has transferred €70,000 (2022: €188,000) to its Regulatory reserve so that the reserve would stand at 11.20% at current year end, in excess of the required limit of 10%.

Legal and Regulatory Framework

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. Is established under the Credit Union Act 1997, as amended. The Credit Union is registered with the Registrar of Credit Unions and is regulated by the Central Bank of Ireland. The principal place of business is Main Street, Dungloe, Co Donegal.

2 **Accounting policies**

2.1 Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102").

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

2.2

The financial statements are prepared in Euro, which is the functional currency of the Credit Union. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest Euro.

2.3 Going concern

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis. The directors of The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. Believe this is appropriate as the Credit Union:

- Is generating annual surpluses;
- Maintains an appropriate level of liquidity; and
- Has reserves that are currently above the minimum requirements of the Central Bank.

2.4 Income

Interest on members' loans

Interest on loans to members is recognised using the effective interest method, and is calculated and accrued on a daily basis.

Investment income

The Credit Union currently only has investments that are valued at amortised cost, and use the effective interest method to recognise investment income.

Other income such as commissions receivable on insurance products and foreign exchange services arises in connection to specific transactions. Income relating to individual transactions is recognised when the transaction is completed.

2.5 Dividends to Members

Dividends on shares and loan interest rebates

Dividends are made from current year's surplus. The Board's proposed distribution to members each year is based on the dividend and loan interest rebate policy of the Credit

The Board in determining the level of distribution considers its ongoing operating expenses, capital requirements and financial risks. Dividends are accounted for when members ratify such payments at the Annual General Meeting. No liability to pay a distribution is recognised in the financial statements until the majority of members vote at the AGM.

The rate of dividend and loan interest rebate recommended by the Board will reflect:

- the risk profile of the Credit Union, particularly in its loan and investment portfolios; the Board's desire to maintain a stable rather than a volatile rate of dividend each
- members' legitimate dividend and loan interest rebate expectations;

all dominated by prudence and the need to sustain the long-term welfare of the Credit Union.



Dividends to Members (Continued)

For this reason the Board will seek to build up its reserves to absorb unexpected shocks and still remain above minimum regulatory requirements.

The Credit Union accounts for dividends and rebates of loan interest when members ratify such payments at the Annual General Meeting.

2.6 **Taxation and Deferred Taxation**

The Credit Union is not subject to income tax or corporation tax on its activities as a Credit

2.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise operating cash on hand and cash deposited with banks with original maturity of less than or equal to three months.

2.8 Financial instruments

The Credit Union has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments. Financial instruments are recognised when the Credit Union becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when, and only when, there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets and liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into.

2.9 Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets are initially measured at the transaction price, including transaction costs, and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Basic financial instruments include the following:

Loans to members are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments. Loans are recognised when cash is advanced to members and measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Investments held at amortised cost

Investments held at amortised cost are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment. This means that the investment is measured at the amount paid for the investment, minus any repayments of the principal; plus or minus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between the amount at initial recognition and the maturity amount; minus, in the case of a financial asset, any reduction for impairment or un-collectability. This effectively spreads out the return on such investments over time, but does take account immediately of any impairment in the value of the investment.

Held to Maturity investments

Investments designated on initial recognition as held-to-maturity are investments that the credit union intends, and is able to, hold to maturity. These are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The fair value of some investment products will change during their life, but they will have a fixed maturity value at some future date. When designated as held-to-maturity, any change in the fair value during the term of the investment is ignored, with the credit union only accounting for interest received.



Other receivables

Other receivables such as prepayments are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective

2.11 Impairment of loans to members

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd assesses, at each balance sheet date, if there is objective evidence that any of its loans to members are impaired. The loans are assessed collectively in groups that share similar credit risk characteristics except for individually significant loans which are assessed on a loan by loan basis for impairment. In addition, if, during the course of the year, there is objective evidence that any individual loan is impaired, a specific loss will be recognised.

Any impairment losses are recognised in the Income and Expenditure account, as the difference between the carrying value of the loan and the net present value of the expected cash flows.

2.12 **Basic financial liabilities**

Basic financial liabilities are initially recognised at the transaction price, including transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Financial liabilities members' shares and deposits

Members' shares in the Credit Union are redeemable and therefore are classified as financial liabilities. They are initially recognised at the amount of cash deposited and subsequently members' deposits are measured at the nominal amount.

Other payables

Other payables are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. Other payables are recognised initially at transaction price.

2.13 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets comprises items of property, fixtures and fittings, and office and computer equipment, which are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of each item of property, plant and equipment, less its estimated residual value over its estimated useful life. The categories of property. plant and equipment are depreciated as follows:

Freehold property 2% straight line Fixtures and fittings 10% straight line 15% straight line Office equipment Computer hardware 20% straight line

Impairment of tangible fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Credit Union reviews the carrying value of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the Income and Expenditure account.



Employee benefitsDefined Benefit Pension Scheme

The Rosses Credit Union Limited participates in an industry-wide pension scheme for employees (The Irish League of Credit Unions Republic of Ireland Pension Scheme). This is a funded defined benefit scheme with assets managed by the Scheme's trustees. The ILCU is the principal employer of the Scheme and The Rosses Credit Union Limited is a participating employer.

The scheme is a multi-employer defined benefit Scheme and there is insufficient information for The Rosses Credit Union Limited to separately identify its share of the Scheme's underlying assets and liabilities. Consequently, the Scheme is currently accounted for as a defined contribution plan.

If an agreement is entered into with the Scheme that determines how The Rosses Credit Union Limited will fund a past service deficit, The Rosses Credit Union Limited shall recognise a liability for the contributions payable that arise from the agreement (to the extent that they relate to the deficit).

Defined Contribution Pension Scheme

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. also participates in a defined contribution pension scheme, to which some of it's employees are members. Pension benefits are funded over the employees' period of service by way of defined contributions paid to an approved fund held with New Ireland Assurance Company PLC. Contributions are based on a fixed percentage of an employee's annual salary and the charge to the Income and Expenditure Account reflects contributions paid and payable in respect of the year ended 30 September 2023.

Other Employee Benefits

The costs of short-term employee benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised as a liability and as an expense (unless those costs are required to be recognised as part of the cost of fixed assets) over the period they are earned.

2.16 Reserves

Regulatory reserve

The Credit Union is required to maintain and establish a minimum Regulatory reserve of at least 10% of the assets of the Credit Union in accordance with Credit Union Act 1997 (Regulatory Requirements) Amendment Regulations 2018.

Operational Risk reserve

The Credit Union has established an Operational Risk reserve which is separate, distinct and in addition to the reserves the Credit Union is required to hold in its Regulatory reserve. The amount held in the Operational Risk reserve is the predicted impact of operational risk events that may have a material impact on the Credit Union's business.

Other reserves - Realised reserves

Realised reserves are the accumulated surpluses to date that have not been declared as dividends returnable to members.



Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain accounting estimates. It also requires the Directors to exercise judgement in applying The Rosses Credit Union Ltd.'s accounting policies. The areas requiring a higher degree of judgement, or complexity, and areas where assumptions or estimates are most significant to the financial statements are disclosed below:

Impairment losses on loans to members

The Credit Union's accounting policy for impairment of financial assets is set out in accounting policy in Note 2.11. The estimation of loan losses is inherently uncertain and depends upon many factors, including historic loan loss trends, credit risk characteristics in loan classes, local and international economic climates, conditions in various sectors of the economy to which the Credit Union is exposed, and, other external factors such as legal and regulatory requirements.

Impairment of buildings

The credit union's policy is to carry out periodic impairment reviews of the credit union's premises comparing the carrying value of each property to the market value at the balance sheet date. Impairment reviews are subject to the assumption that a market exists for the relevant property at the date of review. The estimates of impairment based on market value are recognised in the Income & Expenditure account in the period identified.

The Rosses Credit Union Limited participates in an industry-wide pension scheme for employees (The Irish League of Credit Unions Republic of Ireland Pension Scheme). This is a funded scheme of the defined benefit type, with assets invested in separate trustee administered funds. Judgement is required to assess whether The Rosses Credit Union Limited has sufficient information to enable it to account for the plan as a defined benefit plan. An assessment has been performed of the information currently available and The Rosses Credit Union Limited has determined that there is currently insufficient information available to provide an appropriate allocation of pension assets and liabilities

Additional financial instruments disclosures

18a. Financial risk management

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. is a provider of personal and community loans and also provides savings products to its members. The Credit Union invests excess funds with a view to ensuring that the return from members' loans and investments is adequate to meet the overheads of the Credit Union and provide a reasonable return to members on shares and deposits. The Credit Union has a risk register in place to help the directors manage the various risks arising from its activities to include the issuing of loans to members and investing the excess funds of the Credit Union.

The main financial risks arising from The Rosses Credit Union's activities are credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below.

Credit risk: Credit risk is the risk that a borrower will default on their contractual obligations relating to repayments to The Rosses Credit Union Ltd., resulting in financial loss to the Credit Union. In order to manage this risk the Board approves the Credit Union's credit policy, and all changes to it. All loan applications are assessed with reference to the credit policy in force at the time. Subsequently loans are regularly reviewed for any factors that may indicate that the likelihood of repayment has changed. The credit risk on members' loans is disclosed in Note 12b.

The Credit Union's investments are also exposed to credit risk and the Credit Union mitigates the risk by only placing investments with financial institutions where the counterparties have strong credit ratings and using investment products authorised by the Central Bank.

Liquidity risk: The Credit Union's policy is to maintain sufficient funds in liquid form at all times to ensure that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due. The Credit Union adheres on an ongoing basis to the minimum liquidity ratio and minimum short term liquidity ratio as set out in the Credit Union Act 1997 (Regulatory Requirements) Amendment Regulations 2018.

Market risk: Market risk is generally comprised of interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk. The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. conducts all its transactions in Euro and does not deal in derivatives or commodity markets. Therefore, the Credit Union is not exposed to any form of currency risk or other price risk.

Interest rate risk: The Credit Union's main interest rate risk arises from differences between the interest rate exposures on the receivables and payables that form an integral part of a Credit Union's operations. The Credit Union considers rates of interest receivable on investments and members' loans when deciding on the dividend rate payable on shares and on any loan interest rebate.

18b. Interest rate risk disclosures

The interest rates applicable to loans to members are disclosed in note 17. The dividend on shares and interest on deposits is determined on the basis of income less administrative expenses and as can be seen above, a consistent margin is maintained between interest receivable and dividend on shares. As a result, the surplus for the year is not particularly sensitive to interest rate risk and no sensitivity analysis is presented.

18c. Liquidity risk disclosures

All of the financial liabilities of the Credit Union are repayable on demand except for some members' shares attached to loans and members' deposits which have a fixed maturity date.



Fair value of financial instruments

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd. does not hold any financial instruments at fair value.

18e.

The Credit Union maintains sufficient reserves to buffer the Credit Union against any losses on its members' loans and also its investments. The current Regulatory Reserves are in excess of the minimum requirement set down by the Central Bank and stand at 11.20% of the total assets of the Credit Union at the Balance Sheet date.

19. Pension scheme - Irish League of Credit Unions

The Rosses Credit Union Limited participates in an industry-wide pension scheme for employees (The Irish League of Credit Unions Republic of Ireland Pension Scheme). This is a funded defined benefit scheme with assets managed by the Scheme's trustees.

On 31 March 2022, the defined benefit scheme closed to future accrual and although staff retained all the benefits that they had earned in the scheme to that date, The Rosses Credit Union Limited and its employees ceased making regular contributions to the scheme and ceased earning any additional benefits from the scheme.

At the date of closure of the scheme, there was a past service deficit which was allocated to each individual credit union based on the total benefits earned by staff in each credit union. The Rosses Credit Union Limited's allocation of that past service deficit is €38,000. This total cost is included in the Income & Expenditure account for the year ended 30 September 2022. The deficit amount was paid to the trustees of the scheme during the year.

As this is a pooled pension scheme, The Rosses Credit Union Limited remains liable to cover the cost of their share of any future increase in the total cost of providing the pension payments to credit union employees who were part of the scheme. The Rosses Credit Union Limited could exit the scheme and therefore never have to make a potential additional payment requirement but exiting the scheme would incur a substantial additional cost.

If credit unions exit the Scheme, they are required to pay to the trustees the exit amount which the trustees determine is required to fund benefits in respect of their active, deferred and pensioner members on a "no risk" basis. The exiting credit union thereby settles any liability they have to contribute to the Scheme in the future without increasing the risk for remaining credit unions.

20. Post Balance Sheet events

There are no material events after the Balance Sheet date to disclose.

21. Contingent liabilities

The Rosses Credit Union Ltd had no contingent liabilities at the current or prior Balance Sheet date.

22. Capital commitments

There were no capital commitments either contracted for or approved by the Board at the vear end.

23. Insurance against fraud

The Credit Union has insurance against fraud in the amount of €1,300,000 (2022: €1,300,000) in compliance with Section 47 of the Credit Union Act 1997, as amended.



Related party transactions

During the year loans were advanced to directors, management team and family members of the directors and management team or any business in which the directors or management team had a significant holding in the amount of €95,050 (2022: €15,000). These loans were approved in accordance with the Standard Credit Union rules and the Credit Union Act 1997 (Regulatory Requirements) Amendment Regulations 2018. The loans outstanding from these parties at 30th September 2023 were €265,891 (2022: €151,556). These loans amounted to 2.82% of total gross loans due at 30th September 2023 (2022: 1.65%).

There is a provision of €529 (2022: €1,468) against the loans due from the directors and the management team at the current or prior Balance Sheet date.

The directors and management team share balances stood at €285,717 at 30th September 2023 (2022: €192,471).

REPORT OF CREDIT COMMITTEE

For year ended 30th September 2023

The Board of Directors appoint the Credit Committee annually to assess loan applications in line with our Lending Policy. They meet on a regular basis to assess loan applications.

All loan applications are treated with the strictest confidence and considered individually. Applications are based on your needs, ability to repay and savings record with us and our loan rates are extremely competitive. You can now apply for your loan online as well as in our office. We also have a private room where members can speak with a member of staff when applying for a loan if they wish.

We would encourage our members to disclose all their borrowings for us to treat the application on its own merit and avoid stressing a member's financial situation further.

Loans are on occasion declined, and this is not taken lightly, but we need to protect the Credit Union and member alike. The rejections are usually due to insufficient income, results from the Central Credit Register checks, frequently topping up or poor repayment history.

Personal Loans 12.67% / 9.95% APR
Car Loans 7.12% APR
Student Loans 5.15% APR
Secured Loans (by savings) 5.15% APR
Fuel/Christmas/Holiday Loans 6.15% APR

The Credit Committee are pleased to announce that our loan book now stands at €9,421,931. This has increased from €9,176,194 last year. Loans granted to members this year totalled €4,044,699 in a total of 584 loans. Much of these funds will have been injected into the local economy.

We thank you the members for your support and loyalty during the year and we remind you that for us to continue providing the services that we do; we need our members to continue to borrow from us.

REPORT OF THE CREDIT CONTROL COMMITTEE

For year ended 30th September 2023

The Credit Control Committee ensures that repayments of loans are in accordance with member's credit agreements. We update our policies annually and we follow procedures to ensure this policy is effective. The Committee meets with Credit Control Staff to review arrears and act as required. Monthly reports are submitted to the Board of Directors with details of all credit control activity.

As of the 30th September 2023 our provision for bad debt was \leqslant 401,852 within the context of Accounting Standards Provision FRS102. The Committee feel this provision is prudent and is reviewed regularly with our quarterly loan book review. We recovered \leqslant 30,932 from Bad Debt and there were 9 loans written–off this year totalling \leqslant 39,200. Written–Off Debt will always be followed up for recovery as per Board policy. All members must be aware that defaulting on your loan repayments may affect your credit rating.

We commend the members who continue to meet their loan repayments as agreed even when their financial circumstances have changed. We do understand that members can get into financial situations which they are not prepared for, and this is why we ask them to contact us as early as possible to let us know and to discuss their options.

We have confidential, sympathetic, and experienced staff who are there to help members in difficult circumstances to find a solution to get them back on track.

The committee wish to thank management, staff and colleagues for their help and support during the year. Thank you, the members who continue to repay as agreed.





REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

For year ended 30th September 2023

Membership of the Credit Union at 2023 financial year end was 4,377. We had 212 new members this year with 51% of our new members being under the age of 30. This bodes well for the future of our Credit Union.

Members have many benefits including: Secure savings,

- Competitive, low cost, flexible and convenient loans, Friendly but confidential service,
- Help for borrowers in difficulty,
- All surplus and resources belong to the members, Savings are put back into the local community by way of loans,
- No account fees or charges,

- Online loan applications, Open 6 days per week.

To become a member of the TRCU you must reside or work within our Common Bond (Gweebarra Bridge to Crolly, Aran, Rutland and Fintown).

Plus:

Complete a Membership Application form in the office.

- Proof of Identification required, e.g. Photographic ID, Current valid Passport, Current valid Driving Licence. Birth Cert (Minors)
 Proof of address e.g. Documentation from Revenue Commissioners or other Government
- Department; Electoral Register; Recent Bank Statements; Original recent household bill dated within the last 6 months. For children we need birth cert, proof of PPSN, parents photo ID and a recent household bill
- Evidence of your Personal Public Service Number on an official document e.g., payslip, Revenue documentation.
- A once off Membership fee is €1.27. Minimum shares of €6.35.

Dividends on shares and interest rebate will be paid into member's accounts yearly if available. This is paid from Surplus funds at the end of the year. Members vote at the AGM to decide the rates based on the Surplus and recommendations of the Board of Directors.

All members over the age of 16 should have signed a Nomination Form on the opening of their account for the distribution of their shares up to the value of €23,000 in the event of death. If you need to change your nomination at any time, or if you are unsure if you have previously completed a nomination, please speak to our staff.

Members are reminded that if there has been no member generated transactions for three years, the account will become dormant. If your account has become dormant, please call into us with proof of identity and address for updating your account, where you will also be asked to carry out a transaction on your account to reactivate it.

Please also ensure that the information we hold on you is up to date on our systems by advising us of any changes to your address, telephone number, email address or status. We may contact you to update your information if your documentation is out of date.

Additional information

(1) Scheme responsible for the protection of your deposit Your deposit is covered by a statutory deposit guarantee scheme. If insolvency should occur, your eligible deposits would be repaid up to $\leq 100,000$.

(2) General limit of protection

If a covered deposit is unavailable because a credit institution is unable to meet its financial obligations, depositors are repaid by the DGS. This repayment covers at maximum $\in 100,000$ per person per credit institution. This means that all eligible deposits at the same credit institution are added up in order to determine the coverage level. If, for instance, a depositor holds a savings account with $\in 90,000$ and a current account with $\in 20,000$, he or she will only be repaid $\in 100,000$.

(3) Limit of protection for joint accounts

In case of joint accounts, the limit of €100,000 applies to each depositor. However, eligible deposits in an account to which two or more persons are entitled as members of a business partnership, association or grouping of a similar nature, without legal personality, are aggregated and treated as if made by a single depositor for the purpose of calculating the limit of €100,000.

In some cases eligible deposits which are categorised as "temporary high balances" are protected above €100,000 for six months after the amount has been credited or from the moment when such eligible deposits become legally transferable. These are eligible deposits relating to certain events which include:

- (a) certain transactions relating to the purchase, sale or equity release by the depositor in relation to a private residential
- property;
 (b) sums paid to the depositor in respect of insurance benefits, personal injuries, disability and incapacity benefits, wrongful conviction, unfair dismissal, redundancy, and retirement benefits;
- (c) the depositor's marriage, judicial separation, dissolution of civil partnership, and divorce;
 (d) sums paid to the depositor in respect of benefits payable
- d) sums paid to the depositor in respect of benefits payable on death; claims for compensation in respect of a person's death or a legacy or distribution from the estate of a deceased person.

(4) Reimbursement

It will repay your eligible deposits (up to €100,000); within 10 working days from 1 January 2021 to 31 December 2023; and within 7 days from 1 January 2024 onwards, save where specific exceptions apply.

Where the repayable amount cannot be made available within seven working days depositors will be given access to an appropriate amount of their covered deposits to cover the cost of living within five working days of a request. Access to the appropriate amount will only be made on the basis of data provided by the credit institution. If you have not been repaid within these deadlines, you should contact the deposit quarantee scheme.

Other important information

In general, all retail depositors and businesses are covered by the Deposit Guarantee Scheme. Exceptions for certain deposits are stated on the website of the Deposit Guarantee Scheme. Your credit institution will also inform you on request whether certain products are covered or not. If deposits are eligible, the credit institution shall also confirm this on the statement of account.
